This event is held every year on October 9, retaining its atmosphere of the early modern period (16th to 19th century CE). Small children carry staffs with paper streamers attached and lead a group that brings an offering to the shrine. The festival is a city-designated Intangible Cultural Property.

Yaranosaki Man'yōshū Poem Monument

Yaranosaki is the only location in Japan known to have stationed sakimori coast guards to protect strategic spots in Kyushu. The poem engraved was read by the wife of a

sakimori who did not return after setting sail, expressing their families' sadness at the loss of their loved one.



Nokonoshima Camp Grounds & Swimming Beach

With lush palm trees, the site feels like a tropical island. There is a beach house, as well as bungalows for lodging. You can also rent cooking utensils and other items during your stay.





Nokonoshima Island Park

This nature park in the northern area covers roughly 150,000 square meters. It is well-known for its canola blossoms and cosmos fields, but you can also enjoy other seasonal flowers throughout the year. Lodges are available to rent for accommodation

island's historical and folklore materials are on display here. A separate annex features materials on the repatriation of Japanese nationals from China after WWII, and photos showcasing the works of Dr. Nakamura Tetsu. Open every week from Friday to Sunday, and also on public holidays (open every day throughout May and October, closed on some days during winter).



Dan Kazuo Literature Monument

Engraved here is a haiku poem that was read by the novelist Dan Kazuo only 4 days before his death.

, Eifukuji Temple

A temple of the Sōtō School of Buddhism, this temple was known as Jingūji Temple until the early Meiji period. Its precincts contain a monument to the local western-style painter Tatara Yoshio, as well as the Nihachi Kanon statue: a cenotaph for the 28 people who died when a Noko ferry sank off the shore of the island shortly after

Noko Man'yōshū Poem Monument

The place name "Noko" first appeared in a poem inscribed in the Man'yōshū anthology. An envoy to the kingdom of Silla in Korea who departed from Aratsu composed the

piece while waiting for a favorable sailing wind at Noko-no-Tomari (now Karatomari).






Nokonoshima Island Observatory

From observatory atop the 195-meter summit of Noko, you can see in all directions, including Fukuoka City, the Genkai-Nada Sea and Oronoshima Island in the distance

Engraved on this monument is a tragic poem that is said to have been composed by the novelist Dan Kazuo about his late



wife Ritsuko, while he was gazing upon the Chikugo plains from the hill at the back of Zenkōji Temple in Miyama City.



The Shirahige Shrine enshrines the ubusuna, the local guardian deity. The shrine's buildings are said to have been built in



the Nara era (8th century CE). The sculpture of a hiten angel in the main shrine is simply magnificent.
